

DELIVERY OF GOODS

Books should preferably be collected in person at a time mutually agreed. Postage and packing will be £4.00 for a small book, and £6.00 for two or more within the UK. More than one very light book may be sent at the lowest rate. Overseas postage will be at cost.

PAYMENT

Goods should preferably be paid for in cash. Cheques made out to Jonathan Cooper will also be accepted. Proceeds will benefit the Bibliomaniac Society. The Bibliomaniacs support the Woodland Trust and are trustees of three quarters of an acre of Bisham Woods, Berkshire. They also raise money for the Oxford Children's Hospice.

The Bibliomaniacs are the youngest antiquarian booksellers in the world. We meet every Thursday to discuss recent book sales, and to discover more about the history of literature, books and printing. Founded in 2009 by Jonathan Cooper, Director of Studies at Papplewick (former member of the book department at Sotheby's and now Rare Books Consultant to Brasenose College, Oxford, where he is a member of the SCR) and Lucas Marsden-Smedley, a former pupil. We have visited the British Library, the Bodleian Library, Henry Sotheran, the oldest second hand bookshop in the world, Sotheby's and Bloomsbury auction houses, Winchester and Eton College Libraries. We also travelled to New York City, where we were given the chance to learn and work with the staff of Arader Galleries. The Bibliomaniacs feel honoured to have been elected members of the PBFA in 2016 and have exhibited at the London International Premier Book Fair since. We support the Woodland Trust and the Oxford Children's Hospice.





This is evidently a colonial issue of the DJ as it lacks the price to the spine. It is identical to the UK issue in every other way. This matches its provenance from a distinguished Canadian collection. This is a very rare book in a much rarer DJ. It would be a true highlight to any crime collection and is a must for anyone serious about John Rhode (Miles Burton).






There is a letter from Mrs Chesterton to a Mr Rubenstein dated November, regarding a delay in the production of the play. It claims the play will be produced on 11th of January but it actually debuted on the 19th at the Everyman Theatre. The letter has a 40mm rip in the top right corner with loss but not affecting text

The book is in excellent condition apart from a small amount of tape residue on the endpapers.

This is a rare stage adaptation of G. K. Chesterton's masterful novel of suspicion and suspense, with an interesting letter from the authoress.





Colin Howard is the pseudonym of Howard Shaw, sometime Head of History at Harrow School. As with many books printed by Robert Hale, this is a rare volume.



All other copies we have come across have had the later black lettering. One for a true Marsh aficionado.








