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





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
PAYMENT







Stella Aldwinckle (1909–1989) attended St. Anne's College, Oxford, and read Theology. After teaching for some years, she returned to Oxford University and served on the Oxford Pastorate as Chaplain for Women Students from 1941-1966. She founded the Socratic Club in 1942. The Club brought prominent atheists, agnostics, and Christians together to discuss matters of theology and philosophy in an open forum setting for undergraduates. C.S. Lewis served as the Club's president from its inception until 1954.

This is, by its very limitation, a rare book. The accompanying manuscript leaf is interesting as it is dated "Thursday 27 June 1968. Jim off to Madagascar". Iris Murdoch contributes the "Foreword".

INTRODUCTION


Iris Murdoch was an eminent poet but also a distinguished philosopher born in Phibsborough, Dublin, on 15 July 1919. Her conjectural writings were heavily influenced by Plato. By reviving Plato's theories, she created her own theories including the reality of 'the Good'. From this, she offered intelligent criticisms (and witticisms) of famous philosophers of history, including Kant, Sartre and Wittgenstein.

Her novels also drew on other great thinkers' and novelists' works, including George Eliot, Proust and Tolstoy. However, she did have great variety in her achievements whilst still showing an enduring adoration of Shakespeare.

'Murdoch was a genius', the journalist Bidisha wrote last year, 'She wrote with such depth and variety, producing nearly a book every 18 months over four decades'. Iris Murdoch took on the most profound moral questions that we 'ordinary, flawed, troubled creatures' struggle with: the battle between good and evil within ourselves and within society; the possibility of faith and the death of God. These questions are some of the most interesting because they are the most provocative.

Iris Murdoch died on 8 February 1999 in Oxford at the age of 79.





IRIS MURDOCH'S FIRST COMMERCIALLY PUBLISHED WRITING

The collection contains four poems by Murdoch, whose brainchild this publication appears to have been and who (anonymously) edited it. The poems are "The phoenix-hearted" (pp.5-6), "Star-fisher" (pp.10-11), "The coming of April" (p.16) and "Lower than the angels" (p. 20), and Murdoch is credited as "(Aged 18 years) Badminton School". The collection, printed by Purnell and sons, was designed to raise money for Chinese Medical Aid. The introduction was written by W. H. Auden who believes the volume, "a hopeful sign that the youth of this country is beginning to realise that it must


The symposium on Murdoch's work of which these are the proceedings was held in January 1978. Murdoch herself gave a paper entitled L'Art et L'imitation de la Nature and the other five pieces pay tribute to her work. Included is also a closing debate (in English, unlike the papers that are in French) to which Murdoch makes by far the most significant contribution.




